EYFS and KS1:

In our FS class, they will be starting the new phonics scheme and we have a full set of new reading books to match their learning! Our youngest children will also be moving onto digraphs in phonics and have been working really hard on their common exception words. At the moment, their bookshelf is full of wintery books like 'Betty and the Yeti', 'Snow Angels' and 'Snow Lambs'!

The new phonics scheme for both EYFS and Y1 has amazing interactive big books for the classes to read together online and, soon, you guys at home will have access to eBooks to read too! They even have a quiz at the end!

Y1 will be finishing the book 'My Naughty Little Sister' by Dorothy Edwards. This half term, they'll be enjoying 'The Queen's Hat' by Steve Anthony and 'Dick Whittington'. Their story time book will be a classic – 'A Bear Called Paddington'! Y1 will also be starting the new phonics scheme that has a full range of new reading books to match their learning. Their reading corner will soon be full of books all about London and monarchs, to match their topic learning!

Y2 are still very keen readers, and I know they'll be making lots of progress this half term! They will be finishing 'The Twits' as well as reading 'Daisy and the Trouble with Life' by Kes Gray and 'The Big Book of Bugs' which links to their topics sessions last half term. Don't forget, Year 2 also bring home a reading book each week, a library book and, for some, a phonics book. Plenty of practice!

CHILDREN READ MORE WHEN THEY SEE OTHER PEOPLE READING

Children are made readers on the laps of their parents.

KS2:

In KS2, we look at the same text in our reading and writing sessions. That way, we get a real in-depth understanding of the book!

Y3 will be reading 'The Firework Maker's Daughter' by Philip Pullman, a beautiful story that links to their topic 'Rocks and Relics' (all about earthquakes and volcanoes!). They will also be finishing 'Stig of the Dump' and Mrs. Smeaton allows the class to pick a story they'd like to hear, for their class story. In their linked reading and writing sessions, Y3 will also be looking at 'Stone Age Boy'.

Y4 will be starting to look at 'The River' by Valerie Bloom, a poem with beautiful description. It also links in well to one of the Y4 topics, 'Misty Mountain, Winding River' (full of geography)! Their story time text will be 'Demon Dentist' by David Walliams. A lot of our children seem to love his

Because our writing is based on a video, we're looking at a few different texts in reading. One of them will be 'Unspoken', a fantastic book with no words – only pictures. What the children are able to infer about stories like that always blows my mind! We will also be finishing our class story 'Clockwork' by Philip Pullman and will be starting 'The Kite Rider' by Geraldine McCaughrean, set in 13th Century China and linked with our previous topic, The Shang Dynasty.

Y6 will be starting to look at 'Paperman' by Walt Disney Animation Studios. Not only is it a video, but there are also texts to go with it! Their story time book, 'The Boy at the Back of the Class' by Onjali Q. Raúf was a firm favourite of theirs last year, and I know they'll love to hear it again this year!

- 1. What are you reading at the moment? 'The Terror' by Dan Simmons. It's a historical horror and was adapted into a TV series.
- 2. **What is your favourite children's book?** All-time favourite 'Clockwork' by Philip Pullman. I absolutely love it!

Zoe's uncle travels the globe and finds all sorts of animals who need rescuing. It is Zoe and her mum's job to settle them into their new home.






KS2 Author Focus: Steve Long-Nguyen Robbins
